Rev. Paul Abels lived a life of integrity, courage, and faith with a “million dollar smile.” He worked for social justice, pursued his love of the arts, music and historical preservation, and challenged the church to open its doors to the diverse concerns of the gay and lesbian community.

During his pastorate at Washington Square UMC (known as the “Peace Church”), he nurtured community organizations and oversaw an extensive building restoration campaign. He also began performing “covenant ceremonies” for gay and lesbian members of his congregation.

Controversy ensued when he publicly acknowledged his homosexuality in 1977. He was urged to take a leave but declined, and both NYAC and the Judicial Council upheld his appointment. In 1984 he retired, the same year that General Conference voted to bar actively gay men and women from ordination and serving as clergy.
